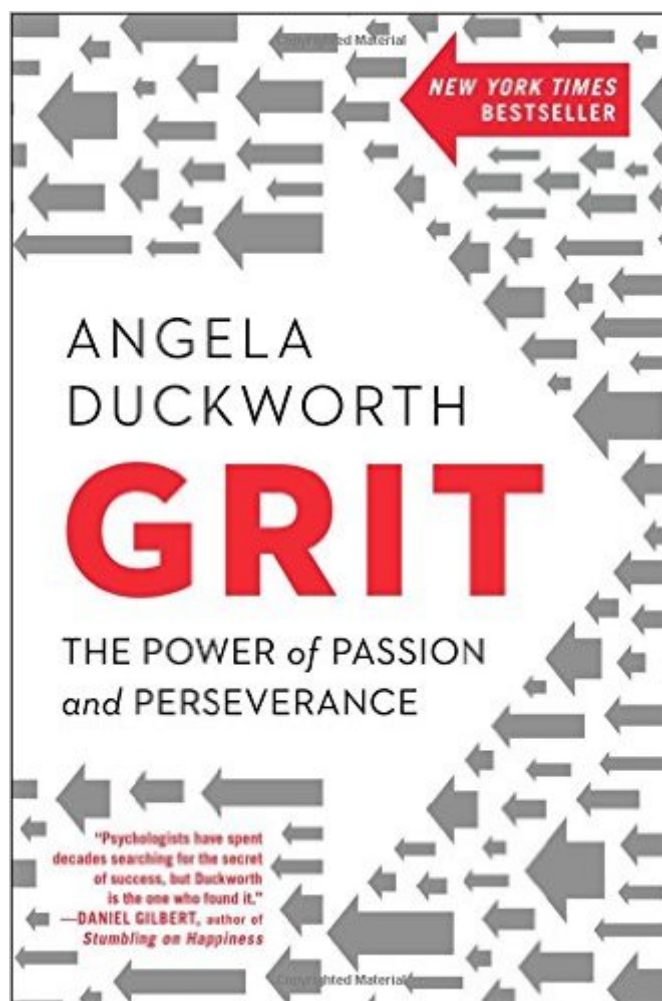


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# Grit: The Power Of Passion And Perseverance



## Synopsis

In this instant New York Times bestseller, pioneering psychologist Angela Duckworth shows anyone striving to succeed—be it parents, students, educators, athletes, or business people—that the secret to outstanding achievement is not talent but a special blend of passion and persistence she calls *grit*. Drawing on her own powerful story as the daughter of a scientist who frequently noted her lack of *genius*, Duckworth, now a celebrated researcher and professor, describes her early eye-opening stints in teaching, business consulting, and neuroscience, which led to the hypothesis that what really drives success is not *genius* but a unique combination of passion and long-term perseverance. In *Grit*, she takes readers into the field to visit cadets struggling through their first days at West Point, teachers working in some of the toughest schools, and young finalists in the National Spelling Bee. She also mines fascinating insights from history and shows what can be gleaned from modern experiments in peak performance. Finally, she shares what she's learned from interviewing dozens of high achievers—from JP Morgan CEO Jamie Dimon to New Yorker cartoon editor Bob Mankoff to Seattle Seahawks Coach Pete Carroll. Among *Grit*'s most valuable insights:

- Why any effort you make ultimately counts twice toward your goal
- How grit can be learned, regardless of I.Q. or circumstances
- How lifelong interest is triggered
- How much of optimal practice is suffering and how much ecstasy
- Which is better for your child—a warm embrace or high standards
- The magic of the Hard Thing Rule

Winningly personal, insightful, and even life-changing, *Grit* is a book about what goes through your head when you fall down, and how that—not talent or luck—makes all the difference.

Angela Duckworth, PhD, is a 2013 MacArthur Fellow and professor of psychology at the University of Pennsylvania. She has advised the White House, the World Bank, NBA and NFL teams, and Fortune 500 CEOs. She is also the Founder and Scientific Director of the Character Lab, a nonprofit whose mission is to advance the science and practice of character development. She completed her BA in neurobiology at Harvard, her MSc in neuroscience at Oxford, and her PhD in psychology at the University of Pennsylvania. *Grit: The Power of Passion and Perseverance* is her first book and an instant New York Times bestseller.

I commend the author for her effort on this book. The stories of people with the ability to persist are lively and interesting, but the overall feeling is of reading small vignette style biographies of people who are smarter, better, and more talented than you are, with anecdotal insights sprinkled throughout. There's a measure of inspiration in her foundational message that, through hard work and persistence, you can become the best version of yourself. Her main point is that it's unlikely that you know your own limits, and that the act of striving against them each day can take you to an unexpectedly good place. However, the true value of this book would have been to teach us the best methods for increasing and maintaining our own grit, and to show that those methods are proven through research. Unfortunately, that doesn't yet exist because the research hasn't been conducted, except in a preliminary fashion. Because that answer doesn't exist, the book and stories are reduced to a collection of recitations of interviews of successful people, not unlike other business and self-help books. It has a dusting of authority from the author herself, since she has substantially contributed to the field. An interested reader can glean their own lessons from that material, in additions to the insights the author provides. Still, the book lacks true weight, and would be greatly served by an update in a few years as the author and her peers conduct more research on the subject.

Save yourself a pile of time and just read her paper "Grit: perseverance and passion for long-term goals", Journal of personality and social psychology, 2007. This book is the results from there, plus a collection of exaggerations and cherry-picked anecdotes.

This is some fantastic self-help material that goes far beyond self-help and into just flat out self-betterment and self-optimization. Duckworth's qualitative and quantitative research never runs dry due to her amazing prose and writing ability. It is a ridiculously quotable book and extremely deep. "Grit" will most likely be a candidate for a re-read.

Â I found this book to be a nice mix of old and new. Old, in that it reaffirmed things that I had learned on my own, or had been taught. New, because the arraignment and sequence of the material took what I had and sharpened it to a more focused point. Congratulations on that, Dr. Duckworth. Her point about breaking down goals into long-term and short-term goals (Ch. 4) was something that FranklinCovey has been teaching since the 1980s, called the Productivity Pyramid. And the need to believe that we can succeed is a rephrasing of the Belief Window, also a FranklinCovey idea (SeeÂ 10 Natural Laws of Successful Time and Life Management, p. 66, 138-139). Let me be clear: I am not accusing plagiarism. What I am asserting is that both Duckworth and FranklinCovey are both on to something, and whatever we call the principle, it works. So use it! I also appreciate how Duckworth distinguishes between internal gritÃ¢ÂÂthings within our sphere of control, and external grit, how to teach grit to children, our teams, or anywhere we are put into leadership positions. It's in the table of contents, if you want to scan-read. But I think slogging through her case-studies is worth the muddy march. I also salute the lack of dogmatism here. In discussing strict and permissive parenting, she compares Mormon quarterback Steve Young with Francesca Martinez, who definitely is not a Mormon quarterback, but a UK comedienne. And her conclusion is that you need a mix of strictness and opennessÃ¢ÂÂbut how that mix works out, well, needs more research. So, a great book for wherever you are in life, and in leadership.

Good to read for the anecdotes, though her argument tends to be a bit reductionist. But it's basically a foil to Malcolm Gladwell's argument in Outliers that much of success comes from factors out of our control. Duckworth argues the opposite - that Grit - can overcome adverse circumstances, thus leading to success.

Angela Duckworth goes out of her way to make her research accessible and inspirational to all. I certainly have a lot to reflect on after reading.

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
