




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Poverty Begins At Home: The Mother-Child Education Programme (MOCEP) In The Kingdom Of Bahrain

The book also discusses different types of intervention and suggests the need for improved standards based on clearly demonstrated 'key' criteria for defining and implementing successful future intervention programmes for families at risk.
