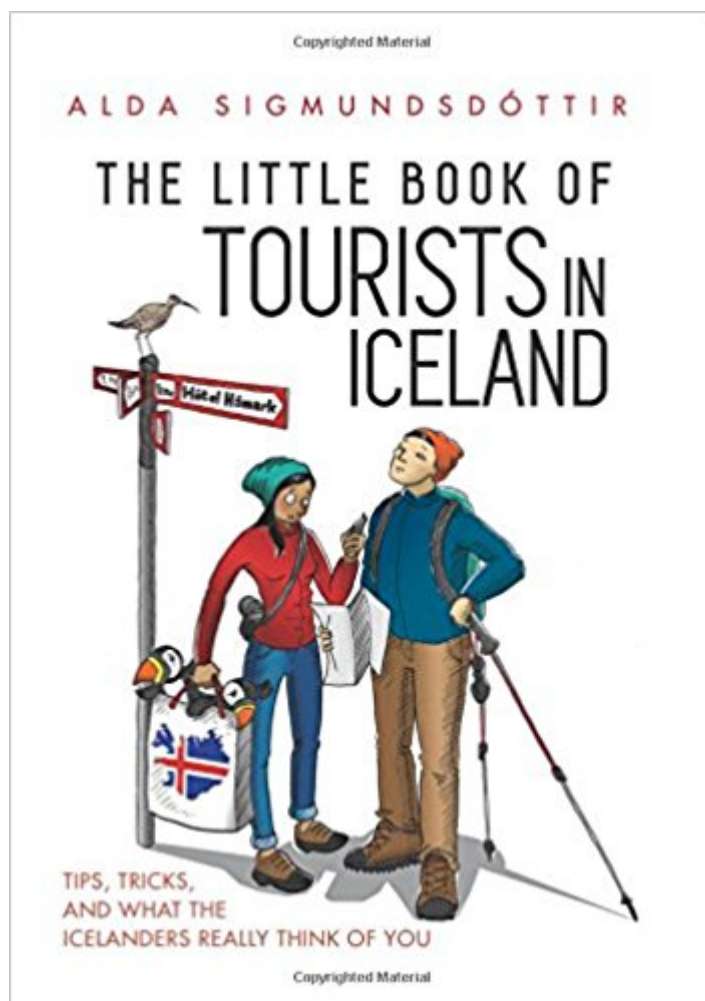


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# The Little Book Of Tourists In Iceland: Tips, Tricks, And What The Icelanders Really Think Of You

I was considering a trip to Iceland. However, if the infrastructure ( especially law enforcement and medical, not to mention the roads), is as unable to cope with the increasing number of tourists as portrayed in this book, it may be best to look elsewhere. Agree- crowded parking lots won't keep me from going to our national parks, so this is a non-issue.

Returning for a second visit, this book was recommended by friends. I learned a lot even though I thought I already was familiar with the country. It's well written, presenting the many times uncomfortable facts with a blend of humor, some resignation to the challenges and a dash of hope for the future. I hope to be at least better informed about what I see and experience, and to appreciate my time there as a visitor.

If the author is correct tourism at recent levels is a social and ecological disaster for Iceland, profiting a small group of corrupt oligarchs at the expense of the public patrimony. This is a good read even if you will never go to Iceland. Tourism is the springboard Alda uses to help explain how Iceland's political and economic system works (or doesn't) and the way landscape has driven culture and values in ways outsiders cannot always appreciate. My favorite part was about questions tourists ask, or the things they think they know about Iceland. People who live on small island nations are often besieged in these times of rapid globalization. Alda helps outsiders see things from an insider's view without being too hard on the outsiders. Clear, conversational, and often funny.

I read this book after I returned from a short layover in Iceland, and in an odd way I am glad I didn't read it beforehand! It lays bare the dark side of Icelandic politics and government, and also many of the dubious practices fueled by the country's new cash cow, tourism. It was dispiriting to read that Iceland has the same 1%er issue with shady governmental tactics that we have here in the U.S. I didn't have a need to believe in Icelandic Elves, but found I had really wanted to believe that

Icelanders were more egalitarian, feminist and noble than my own compatriots. But, the truth is that people are people, the world over! Disillusioning as that is, it really is good to be reminded of this. I really do recommend that everyone going to Iceland read this book! The author writes well and entertainingly. I expected this book to be set up with more Q & A and FAQs. There were some, but there were also long digressions explaining intricacies of political events and the recent financial crisis, on which the author is clearly an expert. However, many tourists are not actually all that interested in that stuff. Of course, a brief overview, and mention when germane is good. But I'd have liked a bit more "Touristy Lite" info. Pretty sure many tourists don't care much about the evil machinations of former Prime ministers, and just want advice on how to have fun without causing offense, and more explanations of local customs and traditions. One area where the author did an amazing job on that kind of thing is when she explained the natural dangers of the land and the enormous rise of Search And Rescue calls, due to the huge increase of tourists and their lack of information and preparedness. Her anecdotes about how to avoid causing offense by camping, bathing or bathrooming willy nilly, are both hilarious and useful! Also the information on how to wash before going into the pool was excellent! I somehow figured this out on my own, just copied the women around me, but I firsthand witnessed a group of teenage girls sent shame-faced back to the showers by the ever-watchful shower police. For all these reasons alone, this book is invaluable! To sum up, while a bit heavy on politics and economics, this little book is entertainingly written and extremely informative on many other subjects important to the average tourist's experience of this beautiful country. Please read it before you go there!

This is the book I was looking for seventeen years ago when I first started visiting Iceland. It is well written, concise, and packed with information about Iceland and its current tourism situation as well as ruminations on what a tourist in Iceland can expect and how a tourist should behave to maximize his or her experience.
